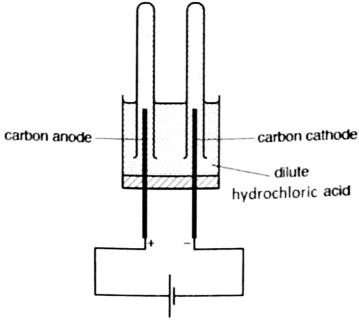

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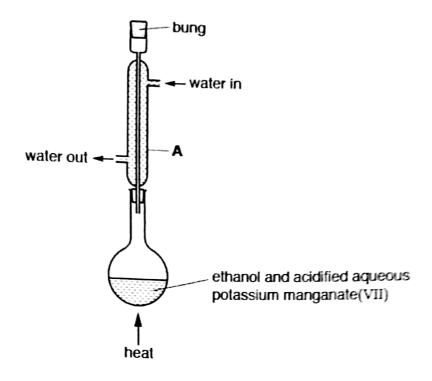

- 4 A student is given an impure sample of magnesium carbonate, MgCO₃ .The student determines the percentage of magnesium carbonate by mass in the sample.
 - (a) The student adds a sample of the impure magnesium carbonate to a previously weighed beaker.

mass of beaker + sample = 53.28g

mass of beaker = 52.86g

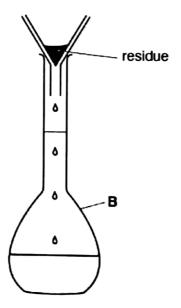
(b) 25.0 cm³ of 1.00 mol /dm³ hydrochloric acid, HCl, (an excess) is added to the beaker using a pipette. The contents of the beaker are stirred.

Magnesium carbonate reacts with hydrochloric acid.

$$MgCO_3 + 2HCI \rightarrow MgCI_2 + CO_2 + H_2O$$

The impurities do not react with hydrochloric acid and remain undissolved.

After reaction, the mixture is filtered into apparatus **B**. The student washes the residue on the filter paper with distilled water, which also passes into apparatus **B**.



The student then makes up the solution to the 250 cm³ mark with distilled water. This is solution **C**.

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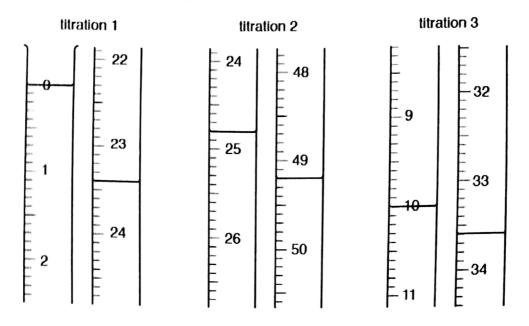

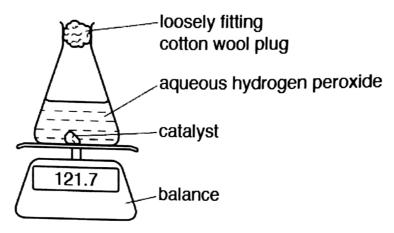

A student investigates the rate of decomposition of hydrogen peroxide by carrying out the reaction as shown in the diagram and making the necessary measurements.



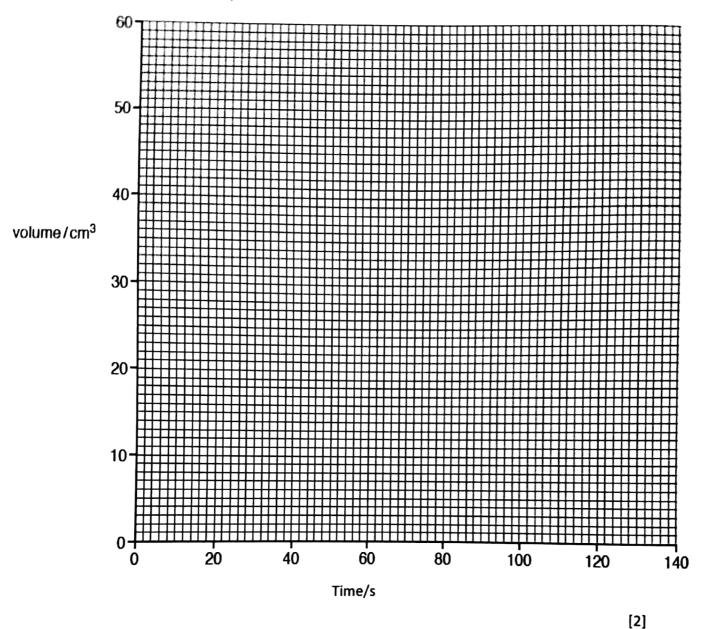
